Long Beach Graduates its first IB Class

Sixteen graduates of the Class of 2012 have officially become the first Long Beach High School students to earn International Baccalaureate (IB) diplomas. Heidi Abrego, Karl Oskar Ahr, Michelle Bello, Emily Charleson, Rachel Convertino, Jacqueline Cook, Andrew DiGiorgio, Liam Fitzpatrick, Aditi Gupta, Eileen Kelly, Roxette Romanes, Alexa Salazar, Angela Sevilla, Matthew Sheehan, Jane Smyth and Sophie Torres joined the ranks of a select group of 25,000 students nationally and 50,000 globally who have completed this demanding program.

Long Beach High School became an International Baccalaureate World School in 2010. The IB Diploma Program is a comprehensive two-year academic program that is designed to prepare young people to meet the academic demands of college while motivating them to become thoughtful, caring and active citizens. Classroom instruction is designed to encourage students to be inquirers, well-balanced, thinkers, caring, reflective, knowledgeable, principled, openminded, risk takers and communicators. Students who are not IB diploma candidates can elect to take any number of the 21 individual IB courses offered at Long Beach High School and receive certificates of credit by taking the IB exams.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SCHOOL NURSES

"A WEALTH OF HEALTH"

A frighteningly growing number of teens around the world are injecting dangerous chemicals under their skin in the name of art and self-expression. The media regularly glorifies **Tattoo Culture** as evidenced by frequent sightings of tattoo-sporting actors, athletes and models. Emulating these celebrities puts our children at serious risk!

A tattoo is a **permanent** mark or design made on your skin with pigments inserted through pricks into the skin's second and deeper layer. Typically, the tattoo artist uses a hand-held machine that acts much like a sewing machine, with one or more needles piercing the skin repeatedly. With every puncture, the needles insert tiny ink droplets. The process, which is done without anesthetics, causes bleeding and significant pain.

The inherent risks of tattooing are many:

- The Food and Drug Administration does <u>not</u> regulate the tattoo industry. Inks contain toxins and possibly cancer causing compounds that are injected directly into the skin. The FDA has only recently begun investigating tattoo inks to evaluate their composition, how they metabolize in the body as well as the short and long-term safety of pigments used.
- Tattoo dye can cause **allergic skin reactions**, even years after application.
- Poor infection control practices have been linked to outbreaks of MRSA infections among tattoo recipients. Tattoos are estimated to account for more than twice as many Hepatitis C infections as compared to IV drug use. Other infections, including Hepatitis B, HIV, and Tetanus can be contracted by tattooing.

- **MRI complications**: Redness or swelling and interference with imaging quality can be caused by tattoo inks.
- **Blood banks**, such as American Red Cross, require a 12 month waiting period, after obtaining a tattoo, in order to donate blood, due to the high risk of infection.
- Persons who are prone to getting keloids, which is an overgrowth of **scar tissue** in the area of a wound, are advised to avoid a getting a tattoo.
- Tattoos change as body grows; **removal** is an expensive, time-consuming and sometimes ineffective process that has its own inherent risks.

The "Do-It-Yourself" tattoo business, with instructions, tools and products available over the Internet, has become increasingly popular, even right here in **Long Beach**! These methods pose an even more serious threat to our teens, as the use of unapproved acid-based dyes, re-use of needles and inks and unregulated, unsanitary conditions expose our teens to an even higher risk of infection, injury and long-term medical conditions.

Parental consent prior to obtaining a tattoo is legally required for a reason! Engage your child in a discussion regarding the topic of tattoos, and help them make an informed decision! If your child decides to obtain a tattoo, they must also accept the responsibility to provide the impeccable care required. THINK BEFORE YOU INK!
